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County-Funded Outreach

Outreach Approach from January to June 2025

The County of Sacramento is the primary entity responsible for providing homeless outreach services to the unincorporated areas and the Parkway. The County's approach to outreach services is multifaceted with teams dedicated to:

- ✓ Proactive outreach to County-identified priority encampments
- ✓ Response driven needs from Sheriff, Rangers, and other County partners
- ✓ Maintaining consistent outreach 'office hours' distributed throughout suburban areas + Parkway

Outreach teams employ a 'case carrying' approach in which they provide on-going engagement focused on resolving a person's homelessness and resource connections.



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County-Funded Outreach

Outreach Team Staffing from January to June 2025

From January to June 2025, outreach teams were composed of both contracted services through **Community HealthWorks (CoHeWo)** and County Behavioral Health Services' **Homeless Engagement and Response Team (HEART)**.

Staffing consisted of:

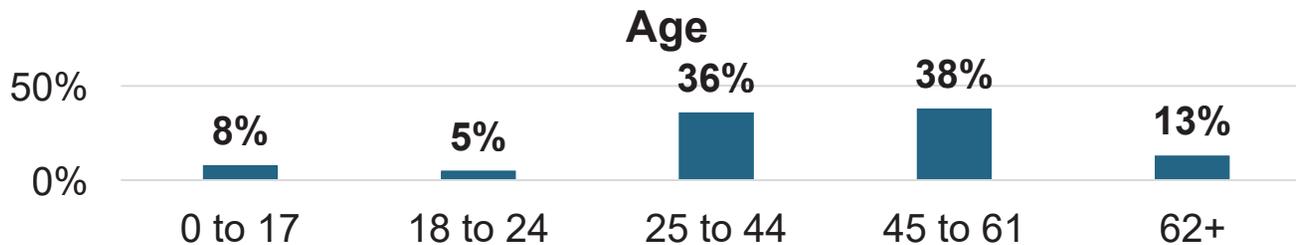
- **10** staff for the Parkway through **CoHeWo**

- **6** staff for the Community Based Outreach through **CoHeWo**



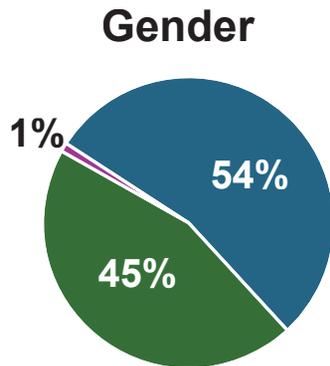

Participant Demographics from January to June 2025

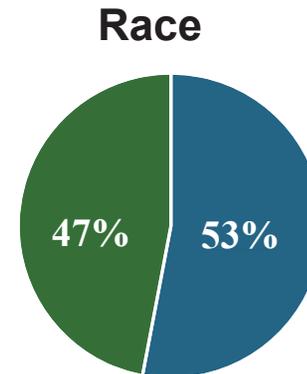

County outreach teams provided **31,355*** services to **771** unduplicated individuals and support **203** unduplicated individuals with transitioning out of unsheltered homelessness (which included shelter and housing).

BHS Unhoused Updates from January to June 2025

HEART and BHS Referral and Linkages

BHS Referrals and Linkages (Does not include HEART)

- **1,569** Unhoused residents were referred to behavioral health service providers
- **1,080** (68.8%) of these individuals were successfully linked to services

HEART Specific Referrals and Linkages*

- **1,612** Outreach and Engagement Attempts
- **320** Referred to BHS Services
 - *Greater Sac-20, All Others-300*
- **178** Individuals Linked to BHS (195 linkages)
 - *Greater Sac-10, All Others-185*

Note: *Greater Sac* refers to the unincorporated regions of Sacramento County and nearby cities excluding Sacramento, including Rancho Cordova, Folsom, Citrus Heights, Galt, Elk Grove, Isleton, and the American River Parkway.

All Others refers to three areas of concentration (Shelter Team, City Partnership Agreement, and Community Based Referrals).

Current Housing Projects

Permanent Supported Housing (PSH) Dedicated to BHS

Existing Housing

- **18** housing developments
- **461** units
- **85** additional units planned as vacancies arise

Future Developments (2025 to 2027)

- **5** new housing developments
- **115** new units

Total housing after completion

- **23** housing developments
- **661** units

Behavioral Health Bridge Housing (BHBH)

Current BHBH Interim Housing

- **229 total units** (248 total beds)
 - **180** single units
 - **19** double units
 - **30** sober living beds
 - Up to 10 beds for families

Future Developments (2025-2026)

- **50** additional Safe Stay beds
- **29** Sober Living Environment beds

Total BHBH after completion

- **327** beds

BHS Unhoused Updates from January to June 2025

BHS Full-Service Partnership Programs

Full-Service Partnership (FSP) programs are recovery-oriented, comprehensive services targeted to individuals who have a severe mental illness often with a history of criminal justice involvement and repeat hospitalizations, who may also be unhoused, or at risk of becoming unhoused.

As of the end of June 2025, the contracted capacity in FSP programs was **3,071**. From January to June 2025, the FSPs served **2,913** (95% of total capacity) unduplicated individuals.

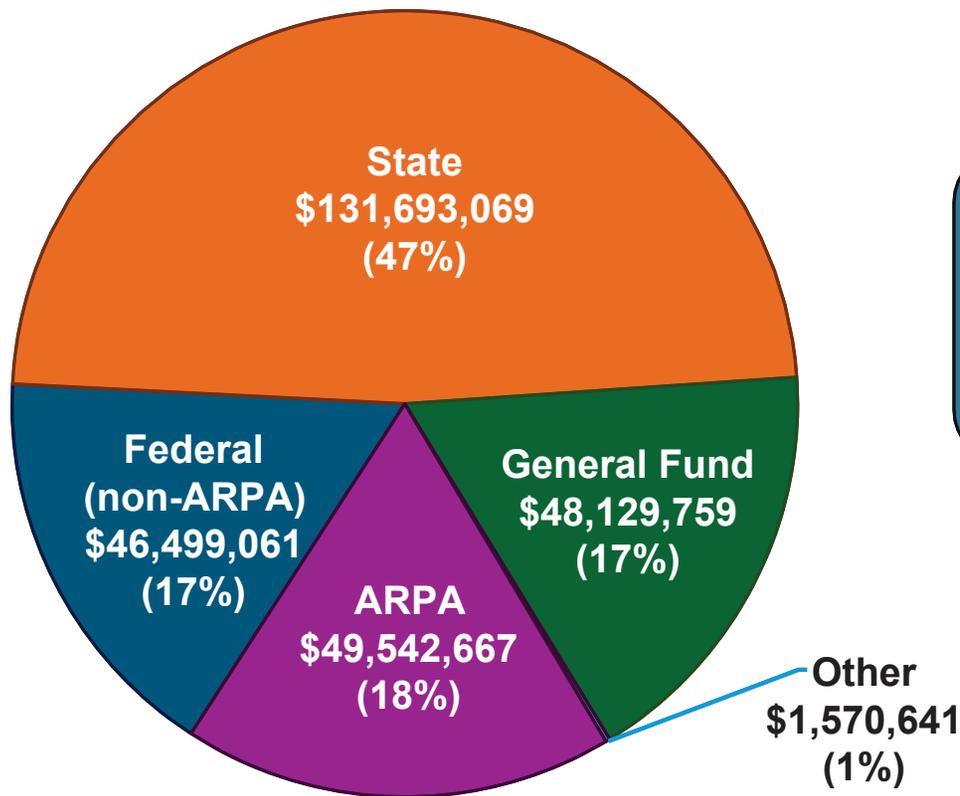
During the reporting period:

- Just over 73% of individuals were living in housing
 - 181 individuals were placed in housing and 1,965 were already living in housing.
- Just over 14% of individuals were in shelters or bridge housing
- Just over 9% were homeless

Countywide FY 24/25: \$277,435,197

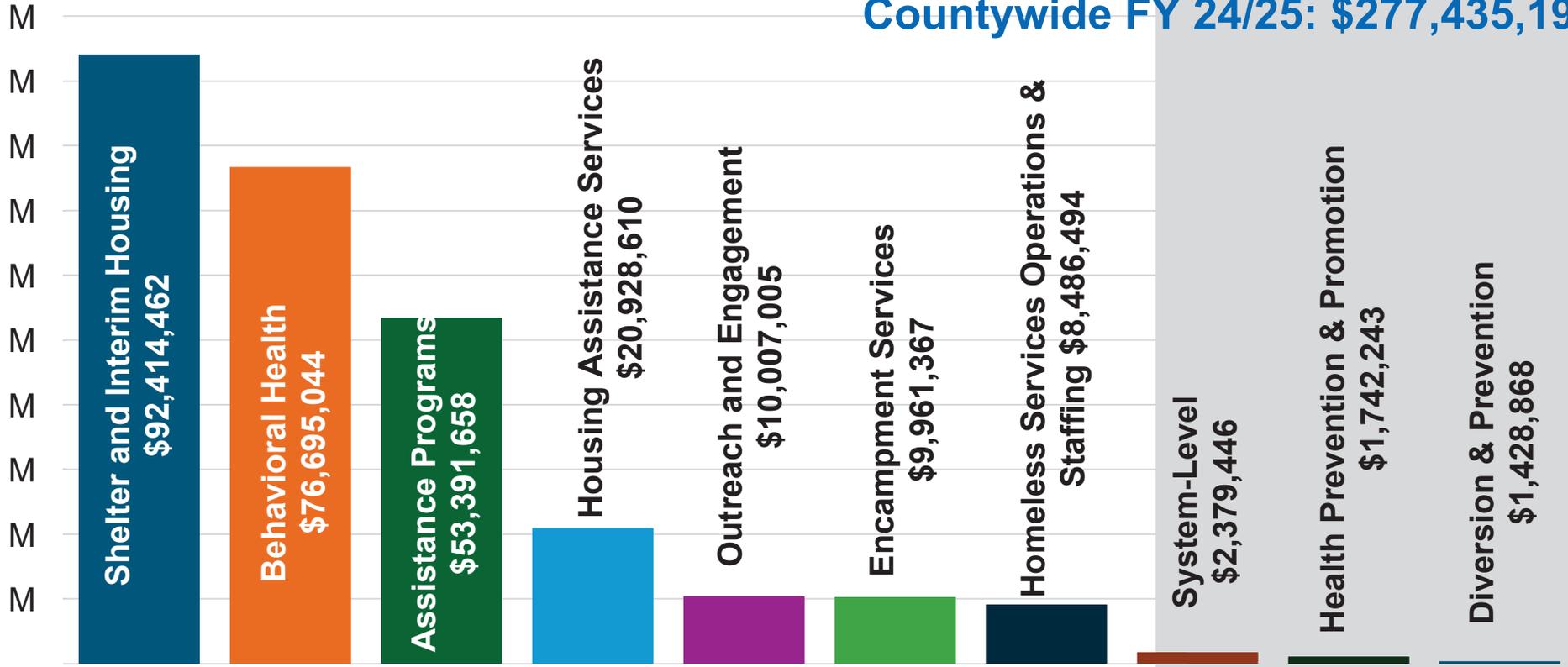
- ❑ Approximately \$39M (14%) allocated to capital costs to construct new Safe Stay shelters
